

IL DUCE THREATENS TO INDUCE CATHOLIC SCOUTS AS FASCISTI

Address Is Taken as Reply to Pope's Criticism on Training of Youth.
MANEUVER BY PONTIFF TO FAIL, PAPER STATES
Vatican Organ Criticized as Improperly Reporting Recent Address.

Rome, March 28 (A.P.)—Premier Mussolini emphasized before his council of ministers today the importance of the induction into the regular Fascist party of 80,000 youths belonging to the *Ballilla* and *Avanguardista* organizations on Sunday. He declared it was a most important moment in the system of universal, integral education and preparation for Italian manhood. He considered that this was one of the fundamental duties of the state.

The Fascist papers accept the premier's words as meaning that he is determined on the "Fascization" of the youth, with the state controlling education. Mussolini's remarks are taken of the press generally as constituting a reply to the criticisms of the papal press of the Fascist education of the youth of Italy.

The extreme Fascist paper *L'Impero* comments in plain-spoken language on the Pope's now famous address to the Roman diocesan board and to the Italian youth on the subject of religion. "Let us venerate religion and incline before the pontiff," says *L'Impero*, "but our sole discipline is that of Italy."

From what is this verbal invective derived? What is beneath it? Who inspired the maneuver? From what strange secret collaboration did the attack emanate?

Destined to Fail, It Views. The paper concludes that since the outward marks of this policy "are living and speaking everywhere in the churches, schools and homes and in the streets," it will not be a victory for the Italian Catholics against the regime.

The maneuver, therefore, it adds, is "destined to fail miserably," remaining, however, as a last page on the debit side of the books of the party against us. It is also an advertisement, especially for those who, like us, have naively believed in the imminent possibility of restoration.

Premier Mussolini spoke glowingly of Sunday's "Fascist levy" when 80,000 youths were inducted into the party. It was not only a ceremony; the premier said in the council of ministers it was a most important moment in the system of universal, integral education and preparation for Italian manhood.

\$62,500,000 STOCK ALLOTMENT BY P. R. R.

Divisions Authorized by Board Amounts to 12 1/2 Per Cent at \$50 Par.
Philadelphia, March 28 (A.P.)—The Pennsylvania Railroad directors today authorized a stock allotment of 12 1/2 per cent at \$50 par.

The allotment will amount to \$62,500,000. The board also authorized the sale of the approval of the stockholders, of \$17,600,000 capital stock to the company's employees upon such terms as the board shall from time to time order.

Both issues of stock are subject to the approval of the Interstate Commerce Commission. The first allotment would be effective, but it was said that this would be made known later in a statement to be issued by President W. W. Atterbury.

The announcement of the allotment did not come as a surprise in financial circles. It had been long rumored for some time. The par value of the stock is \$50. It sold at \$70 today.

ADORNED AND INDICTED WITH 40 IN CHICAGO AS ALCOHOL CHIEFS

Prohibition Men Tap Wires and Open "Booze Joints" to Obtain Evidence.

FORMER LINCOLN PARK COMMISSIONER HELD One Dry Agent Among Those Accused; Political Plot, Says Councilman.
Chicago, March 28 (A.P.)—An alderman, a former Lincoln Park commissioner, and nine others were indicted by a Federal jury today on charges of operating a \$5,000,000 alcohol ring which has been flooding Chicago and the Middle West with liquor.

"The grand jury today followed months of investigation by prohibition agents who gained the confidence of the Forty-third ward gang," tapping wires, attending political meetings, opening "booze joints," gambling establishments and stills to obtain the names of the gang, the councilman said.

"I can't understand this charge," said Hafla. "I never sold a drop of liquor." He is running for commissioner of the Forty-third ward on the Gov. Small, Mayor Thompson ticket.

Police on Pay Roll. The grand jury action followed months of investigation by prohibition agents who gained the confidence of the Forty-third ward gang.

The main still of the gang, the agents claimed, turned out 10,000 gallons of liquor a month, and half a million bottles of gin. The gang bootleggers supplemented that supply. A regular pay-off system was maintained, they found, which included politicians, prohibition agents and the police.

Others Under Charges. Those indicted included Albert P. Bauer, former Lincoln Park commissioner and secretary-treasurer of the Republican Boosters Club in the Forty-third Ward; Joseph Bagaria, president of the club; John Joseph Wahl, head of the permit division of the local prohibition office.

Wahl was charged with accepting a bribe of \$25,000 from bootleggers who returned the chief ones naming Hafla. Twenty-three other acts were named, charging the men with sale, transportation and manufacture of liquor.

AGREEMENT WITH PARIS CUTS ROMANIAN DEBT
Paris, March 28 (A.P.)—Romania's debt to France has finally been adjusted by an agreement reducing it to about one-third of the real debt through 62 annual payments.
