WORLD LISTS NEARLY 44 MILLION MOTOR VEHICLES THIS YEAR

Washington, D. C., Aug. 7 [Special]. —The department of commerce today reported that world registrations of passenger cars, trucks, and buses last year increased the total to the record of 43,819,929 vehicles in operation as o Jan. 1, 1939. ROOSEVELT SIGNS BILLS REVISING 3 LAW ON PATENTS

One shortens and simplifies the contests in the patent office by elimi-nating one of the two or more ap-peals previously permitted. Inventors are required by the sec-and to fle their explication for natant

Inventors are required by the sec-ond to file their application for patent within one year, instead of two as previously, after they make their in-vention known to the public. The third requires that any person who believes himself a prior inventor must file an application within one year and start a contest within one year after a patent is granted. Fre-viously two years were allowed.

New Auto Window Glass Made to Relieve Eyes

Toledo, O., Aug. 7 (A).—The Gen-ral Motors corporation and the ibbey-Owens-Ford Glass company eral Libbey-Owens-Ford announced jointly today development of new "eye glass" windows, for automobiles, designed to combat driving fatigue and visual inefficiency.
