

Dulles Aids Deny Charges Made By Soviet Journal

NEW YORK, March 4—Friends of John Foster Dulles, Republican adviser on foreign affairs who is going to Moscow with Secretary of State George C. Marshall, said on March 3 that none of the charges made against him by the Soviet publication *New Times* is correct, except one.

Mr. Dulles' brother, Allen, was at one time a director of the J. Henry Schroder Banking Corporation, from which directorship he resigned in 1942, it was said. Otherwise, persons close to Mr. Dulles declared the charges in the Russian journal are without foundation.

Mr. Dulles himself was not available for comment. However, his international position, as re-

lated to the charges contained in *New Times*, was described as follows:

"Mr. Dulles was never an author of the Dawes plan, nor did he ever have any official connection with it, although some who did have official connection consulted with him, among many others, as to how to get maximum reparation payments out of Germany, which was the essential purpose of the Dawes plan.

"He never has had any connection, direct or indirect, with the German Schroeders. So far as is known, he never met any of them and certainly never had any dealings with them. The New York Schroder Banking House is connected with partners of J. Henry Schroder & Co., London, a long-established English firm which, like many other English firms, has remote family connections in Germany.

"He was never a supporter of the America First Committee nor did he attend any of their meeting or contribute anything whatever to them.

"He was never isolationist. All his life he has favored international collaboration, including United States membership in the League of Nations. He frequently has been attacked in this country as an 'internationalist.'

"Allen Dulles, as representative of the OSS in Switzerland, acted in all political matters pursuant to the policy of the Roosevelt Administration and in particular, in dealing with German Underground elements working against Hitler, consistently stipulated that the United States would never deal on the basis of a separate peace, but only on the basis of a peace which included the Soviet Union."
